1. INTRODUCTION: DINAMIA'CET-ISCTE AND ITS SCIENTIFIC IDENTITY

1.1. DINAMIA'CET-ISCTE Scientific Identity¹

DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE (D'C-ISCTE), Centre for the Study of Socioeconomic Change and the Territory is an ISCTE-IUL interdisciplinary research unit in social and human sciences, which combines fundamental and applied research on relevant economic, social and cultural topics.

We perform advanced international and comparative research, framed by a sustainable development approach, while pledging to increase knowledge about dynamics and changes of Portuguese society.

We seek to contribute to the understanding of the contemporary world and to the design of the future through the analysis of contexts, actors and consequences of change, encompassing a particular focus on public policy and institutional frameworks, on an analytical and a normative level.

D'C-ISCTE mobilizes an array of theoretical and methodological resources guided by a shared core issue. What is at stake is to capture the nature of the dynamics underlying socioeconomic and territorial change, their genesis in the inter-play between collective public and private actors operating in different domains (e.g. markets, territorial communities, public spaces), as well as their impact, notably in spatial terms (landscape, morphology, etc.).

Researchers at D'C-ISCTE pay particular attention to individual action (choices, expectations, creative insights, emotions, etc.) and to institutional endeavours stemming from states as well as sub-, inter- and supranational bodies to moderate, boost or restrain such action.

Research focused on the evaluation of the consequences of such institutional regulation is also based on a reflexive analysis of our own domain of activity - scientific research, its relationships with its context and the changes it goes through, in line with D'C-ISCTE's strategic objective to promote the self-reflexivity of its researchers.

1.2. Organization and Activities

DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE gathers researchers from a wide range of academic backgrounds (economics, sociology, law, architecture, regional and urban planning, anthropology, geography, management, quantitative methods, etc.). It is organized in three *research groups*:

(i) Innovation and Labour (IL);

- (ii) **Cities and Territories (CT);**
- (iii) **Governance, Economy and Citizenry (GEC).**

Each research group has specific research programmes, drawing upon medium-term thematic lines of analysis, which reflect their particular scientific identity. Information about the specific scientific identity of each of these groups, as well as about their main goals and achievements, can be found below and in Part 3 of this Action Plan.

It seeks to drive its activities and to reinforce its consistency through cross-sectional integrating thematic lines (ITL) set to boost synergies between the three groups:

- (i) Innovation and Transition to Sustainable Societies**
- (ii) Regulatory and Governance Challenges for Complex Societies**
- (iii) Creative and Participative Lives in Empowered Societies**

Activities taking place at D'C-ISCTE combine research with service provision to the community, and advanced training (masters and PhD programmes). The Centre is invested in the articulation between teaching and research, according to international higher education standards. It nurtures the transfer of scientific knowledge through seminars, conferences and publications. It also promotes internal debate and collegial co-operation in order to favour theoretical and methodological cross-fertilization between its different projects, and to foster collective learning and capacity for organizational adaptation and innovation. Its members share the belief that public universities should produce knowledge that may underpin the public debate, namely the debate about public policy design and implementation.

D'C-ISCTE publishes an online journal, *CIDADES, Comunidades e Territórios*, and a Working Paper series, both peer-reviewed. It also participates in publishing *Portuguese Journal of Social Science* and the journal *Passagens*, in collaboration with the Architecture PhD programme.

These activities are supported by a close-knit network of partnerships with other national and international research units, public agencies and civil society players.

1. Innovation and Labour (IL)

The general theoretical framework of the IL Research Group is that sustainable growth comprises environmental, economic, social and political dimensions that have to be dealt with in an interrelated manner. It is now consensual that the current growth regime is at stake since it is undermining some of its own major pillars, such as the responsible use of natural resources and social cohesion. In our view, mainstream economic theories have exerted a substantial influence in exacerbating the natural resources and social cohesion challenges that our societies are now facing, and due attention needs to be systematically paid to the prevailing economic theories when dealing with these issues.

The group is focused on two interdependent domains (Innovation and Labour) and their interconnections.

Regarding Innovation, IL works on the transition to sustainability of large sociotechnical systems, like the energy and food systems. It also studies the emergence, development and diffusion of scientific and technological knowledge and innovation and the patterns of spatial diffusion of new technologies, namely renewable energy technologies. The other main topics of research are: the formation and deployment of knowledge-intensive firms, academic spin-offs, start-ups and others; the intellectual capital management; and the emergence and role of actors, values, norms, policies and forms of governance in these processes.

Regarding Labour, IL works on contemporary labour market issues in Portugal and the EU. The research agenda draws on a multidisciplinary approach, combining sociology, political economy, industrial relations, management studies and social psychology, and using qualitative and quantitative methodologies. The agenda addresses issues associated with sources and consequences of stratification and inequality; and with intervention of state and social actors in the labour market. The research topics are: education and skills; work and job quality; unequal treatment of categories of workers; youth employment and unemployment; traditional and new vulnerable workers; trade unions and labour market regulation.

Methodological pluralism is a key feature of this Group. It combines qualitative and quantitative approaches; uses innovative data analysis techniques to deal with both approaches (e.g. social network analysis, fsQCA and fuzzy cluster analysis); and deploys the appropriate econometric tools to analyse the datasets. Another key feature is the combination of theoretical work with empirical research, drawing on comparative analysis.

2. Cities and Territories (CT)

This Group focuses its research on the territorial dimensions of contemporary socioeconomic, environmental and cultural change, analysing its complex restructuring mechanisms in the light of their spatiality, i.e. their territorial embeddedness and their spatial-morphological dimensions, framing them with a view to acting towards the promotion of multidimensional sustainable development processes.

The deep restructuring processes which affected the organization of socioeconomic and physical systems since the 1970's, and their technological and socio-cultural drivers, raising the centrality of informational, cognitive and symbolic contents to these processes, brought new challenges to the way we conceptualize, empirically analyse, plan and develop public policies to urban and rural territories. The complexity of movements and rationalities behind centripetal and centrifugal dynamics which affect urban systems and the organization of metropolitan spaces today raise also new questionings and challenges to the ways cities are shaped and planned and how academics can develop tools to understand and act in increasingly complex systems and develop tools to promote their resilience. This research group invests in the disentangling of these processes, through a variety of themes (e.g., the urban form, creative dynamics, ways of inhabiting, recomposition processes, urban representations, among others) and empirical contexts (from the in-depth analysis of Portuguese metropolitan areas

and cities, to comparative analysis with European or Lusophone cities, for example), favouring an interdisciplinary perspective which is nurtured by the diversity of this research group.

The Cities and Territories Research Group strategy for deepening knowledge about the dynamics of change in these spatial and territorial terms is based on the acknowledgment of the diversity of logics, processes and actors that produce and appropriate these processes. This is always done from a triple perspective, involving (i) the analysis of the "dynamics" themselves; (ii) the understanding of the regulation and planning issues and the aspects related to urban/territorial action and "policy-making"; and (iii), a "reflexive" consciousness of the way these spaces are worked and how they are studied.

This encompasses a permanent concern with the deployment of new planning methodologies and ideas in urban and social policy design, often based on research-action processes, and fostering the creation of useful knowledge to facilitate agents' action and policy-making, concerning urban planning and regional/local development strategies in Portugal and elsewhere, and providing public officials and community leaders with new tools for management and policy analysis.

The research group is also committed to the development of new methodologies to disseminate research results to society and to consolidate bridges between academia, policy makers and civil society.

3. Governance, Economy and Citizenry (GEC)

This Group focuses its research on the modes of regulation and governance, encompassing state's intervention, markets and forms of collective action in the context of Europeanization and globalization trends. It is assumed that, in addition to the means used by governments to guarantee the rule of law and to promote public policies, new forms of public and private regulation are becoming increasingly relevant, based on co-operation, self-regulation and mobilization of social actors. Both formal modes and processes of regulation, including the legislative procedure, as well as "soft" law-making and informal modes of social and economic (market) regulation are studied, with special attention to their impact on the citizens' individual rights and capacity of action, which they can promote or hinder. Among the domains under scrutiny are environmental and public health risks, ICT, financial markets, social policies.

This Group also provides a framework for research on science communication and public engagement, as well as the role and social responsibility of science and its actors, including researchers and research institutions, all of them actually increasingly asked to participate in regulatory processes. This is in line with the Centre's strategic objective to promote the self-reflexivity of its researchers in order to better serve society. Economics has been especially concerned by this endeavour, but other scientific disciplines of relevance to the Centre – namely architecture and law – started similar lines of work.

Taking advantage of inputs from economics, jurisprudence, sociology, political science, architecture and computer science, these Research Group's thematic lines follow up from this backdrop, sustained by work developed in recent years at the Centre under projects BECOM, Value Isobars, Protect, Risks of S&T in the Era of Social Networks, FESSUD, MORE-PE, OPEN-EC and RECON.

1.3. One Critical Immediate Challenge

We finalize this Action Plan in April-May 2020, in a time of planetary confinement due to the COVID-19 pandemic. What we had in mind when we started its drafting had to be completely re-designed. As professionals of all domains, we face this question: how can we help?

We identify two priorities:

On the one hand, as scientists, we must help to understand what happens to us humans. As social scientists, we have, firstly, to participate in the effort to gather knowledge about the disease itself, focusing on its social dimension, measuring how it moves in society, in time, in space, and throughout social milieus and communities. Our skills in dealing with territories qualify us in particular for the monitoring the spatial dynamics of the pandemic. Secondly, another contribution lies in observing, analysing and, as far as possible, anticipating the reactions of society towards the pandemic, and the effects of those reactions. How do human groups perceive the disease, at a local level, at the level of cities, countries, internationally? How do these different perceptions interact? How do these groups react, at a multiple level? If their option is to protect themselves as a group, what measures do they take? How do they respond to the real cases of contamination? What are the measures to prevent contamination? What measures in case of death? What could be the short- and long-term impact of these measures? And what may be the structural changes in the perceptions, attitudes, behaviours, practices of people and of public authorities after this crisis? What will people be doing and accepting, how will communities and institutions react to new practices, made possible through the confinement period, all over the world? In the coming weeks, there will be many specifications of these questions in the research units around the world, and many new questions will arise that we are unable to imagine at the moment. The challenge now is to identify as soon as possible in what directions we, DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE, have a chance to add some instrumental knowledge to the cognitive supply that we, as scientists, will soon have to provide to society.

The most sensible way to identify these directions is to take as a starting point the work recently done, and to imagine possible applications in this situation. This implies what we have to do every year when drafting our Action Plan: to read our own Scientific Report carefully. Traditionally, our Scientific Reports, as well as our Action Plans, are structured according to our organizational structure, which means with separate chapters devoted to each of the Research Groups. This makes sense as these Research Groups form specialized communities of researchers, within which we may assume that there is a link – even if loose – between the different ongoing projects. This is because, within these Research Groups, certain researchers are involved in different projects, and some researchers who launch new projects were trained or supervised by researchers involved in other projects. This gives a particular meaning to the outputs' lists presented in the Scientific Report. The reading of these lists suggests several research topics, which we put forward in the following paragraphs. Naturally not all of them will be addressed in our research. This is not a new research agenda. They are just taken here as examples of potential research streams that can draw upon our existing lines of work and on DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE researchers' interests (some of

these already materialized in significative adjustments on the research proposals that are being proposed to the calls open by FCT and EC, as well as in different kinds of participation of our researchers in public space and in science dissemination initiatives, and other endeavors will certainly be developed in the short term around many of these topics).

What will be the reaction of companies, universities, public and private agencies of innovation, to the demands of society in time of pandemic? What will be the capacity for innovation in face of a completely unexpected challenge? How can this capacity be stimulated?

What will be the impact of the pandemic on firms, and in particular on the relationship with their employees? What will be the impact of the pandemic itself, as well as of the measures taken against it, in particular the confinement, on working conditions? What will be the impact on perceptions that management and employees will have about their role in their societal environment? On the perception of corporate responsibilities? On the perception of the management's authority? What will be the long-term impact on the dualization of labour markets? On the perception of the economic and the social value of the different types of jobs? On the perception of the importance of the different sectoral activities? On the perception of the role of public employment in contemporary societies? What will be the impact of the pandemic on employment and unemployment trends? And what will be the change of the sectoral composition of employment and on the evolution of wages and how it may be related to the evolution of income inequality trajectories?

What will be the impact of the pandemic on creative and cultural activities, on the conditions for their material production and public circulation? To what extent can the pandemic transform our imagination of social reality, and its potential to transform that reality? Where to go from the emerging spreading cultural free offers on digital platforms, during the pandemic crisis, acting as a "social connector" that people can engage with from home? What measures should there be to support the cultural activities and cultural workers, which have very precarious positions?

What will be its impact on our perception and uses of territory and space; of the spaces required for our protection and of those that are barred to avoid contamination? Will closed territories in terms of spatial mobility be ready to deal with openness at social and cultural levels? Will our perception of territories enhance difference and diversity or, on the contrary, will they elapse in the negotiation of collective identities?

Taking advantage of the situation of confinement, it might be time to question people's expectations of public space, now that they miss it. The relation between private and public space is indeed being reconsidered by everyone, at individual level, but also collectively. What are and what should the mechanisms of negotiation be between the individual and the collective sphere? Between the public and private spaces? How can the social and the material characteristics of commonality be managed and improved?

How do we experience confinement? What does it mean to stay at home indefinitely and to have to combine activities that are socially and, usually, also spatially differentiated? What are the differences in these experiences, given the unequal living conditions?

What will be the direct and indirect effects of the collapse of mass tourism, which has gained a decisive weight in the Portuguese economy, in particular after the 2007-08 financial crisis? How will this impact on the social, economic and morphologic restructuring processes ongoing in our city centres?

How will the housing market react to the current situation?

What will be the impact of the pandemic and the consequent confinement measures on what we have come to call the metabolism of our cities? How can we see the changes in the way we produce, distribute, and consume in our cities, in our neighbourhoods, in our metropolitan areas, in our rural communities? How can these new practices interfere in the ecological sustainability of these territories?

How do our governments react to the pandemic? How do national and local governments reorganize themselves? What happens at the European and at the international level? How do our societies accept and/or negotiate the new forms of regulation and social (and governmental) control? How do communities organize themselves to face the challenges of the pandemic and to provide proximity support and enhance solidarity, despite inadequate forecasts and the scarcity of stocks?

One of the topics worth being followed in this research unit is the protection of personal data. How do governments balance, on the one hand, the need to control the evolution of the pandemic, and the technological possibilities for developing the corresponding control mechanisms, and, on the other hand, the constitutional principles considered fundamental for establishing a relationship of trust between citizens and their governments?

What is the impact of the current situation on the conditions of our own activity as social science researchers? What will be the consequences on our forms of organization, communication, teaching, producing knowledge and even thinking, after this period of confinement, which forces us to use only virtual channels of communication? By the way: how safe are they?

Throughout the last decades, as a radical version of a historical trend, articles in academic journals have become the dominant output of researchers' activities. This type of output, with the time needed until new evidence is made public, and considering the difficulty of access for non-specialists, seems hardly compatible with the societal demand in the coming months or even weeks, which will require quick answers that can be discussed and reused also by non-specialists. Will we be able to develop alternative ways of producing and publishing science, without renouncing the requirements of validity, liability, accountability that characterize scientific work?

What consequences could the current situation have on the perception of our mission as scientists, as well as of our scientific freedom, by ourselves, by our governments, by society? What new developments will be necessary in the discussion of the ethics of research?

On the other hand, we must keep our ongoing research activity, even if reducing to some extent the resources made available for this. To neglect our long term projects would make us lose the means we have to offer to those who demand scientific expertise on what they need most from

our part: views on social reality which add significantly new insights to the common experience of social reality. One could say: we are asked to deliver cognitive added value.

In our case, a relevant stream of activities recently developed is the implementation of our integrating thematic lines. This was to be one of the main points in the originally planned introduction to this Action Plan. Should we postpone our work in this domain? Our answer is that this work has gained new relevance under the given circumstances. A common thread linking all above listed questions is the one that identifies DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE: what is social change? What are its causes and consequences? Moreover, to what extent – presumably modest – are we able to steer it? The current situation gives new relevance to a point we had the opportunity to address during recent discussions within DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE: the scope of this notion. The emergence of a new virus has a huge impact on society – it dramatically changes the world in which society reproduces itself – without being, as a change in this world, a social change in the sense we learned to give to the term. This obliges us to take into account in our work of social scientists the fact that society is part of broader world, and to better understand the interdependence relationship between the different parts of that world. Now if serious changes in that world put parts of it at risk, this requires human action, or more precisely new types of actions meeting the new threats. New types of human action, however, are only possible if society changes. Here we meet again our topic. What is at stake is to contribute to understand the huge and quick changes that are taking place these days, and those to come, as a consequence of the pandemic, in particular at economic and political levels.

It is time to assess the relevance of the work we have been doing in recent years on the issues addressed by these integrating thematic lines and, at the same time, to participate in the analysis and discussion of our near future. We have some reasons to admit that this work may be useful. Firstly, we are heading towards a period in which the aggregated dynamic considered as an essential characteristic of late modern societies – economic growth – will be slowed down to an unprecedented extent, challenging the material conditions of our individual lives, but also the conditions of a relatively peaceful coexistence between social classes, or between countries or regions of the world. We urgently need to understand this dynamic and its changes. And it is not the only aggregated societal dynamic that we are experiencing these days. Secondly, governments are being challenged to adopt new techniques of governance and, like all organizations, small or large, they need to use new mechanisms of human co-operation, and new mechanisms for social control. Thirdly, individuals are called to participate in the defense effort as individuals, and governments, as well as companies and individuals, experience the relevance of the dynamics emerging in the private sphere, as well as its dangers, as the current figures on domestic violence teach us.

The analysis of these different types of social dynamics and forces may also help us to approach the now indispensable discussion of the narratives, which seek to favour their merging in the generation of effective social change processes. After narratives based on the notion of creative and productive individuals, aware of their rights and interests, and others, based on the notion of efficient, competitive and profitable organizations, now may be the time to debate if and how is it possible to bring back into these narratives notions such as care and justice. And, among other recent developments, the debate about climate change and global warming forces us not to

restrict their scope to the relationships between humans. As citizens, we have to participate in that discussion. As social scientists, we have to research under which conditions it can take place and what can its possible consequences be.

That is why, in line with the strategic programme accepted in 2019 by FCT, a programme designed on the basis of the existing research potential of DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE, we will continue, in this year 2020, to seek to improve our research capacity as specialists in specific domains in order to apply it usefully, now, as far as possible, in our responses to the urgent societal demand for help in the face of the pandemic. And to upgrade concepts that can help us to better combine our research tools across specific fields, trying to contribute to the production of an outlook of society as a whole. One that the social sciences are now forced to produce, in a moment when society is experiencing a catastrophe, surprisingly doubling other dangers, that threaten it, for the first time in history, as a world society.

This 2020 Action Plan, much to our regret, only partially develops the present programme in the following chapters. At this moment of the year, we preferred to give priority to the conclusion of this document, without all the adaptations considering the current situation. This should enable us to channel, as soon as possible, our energies to the effort to adapt and improve research projects, and other initiatives currently in preparation, to grant them the best possible conditions for success, in particular in the calls soon coming to close.

2. MAIN GOALS FOR 2020

2.1. Framing in the global strategy to 2018-2022

DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE strategic goals have been designed on the basis of its legacy of theoretical and empirical research, and accumulated experience of co-operation with other national and international research units, as well as an history of collaboration with public entities and civil society since it was founded.

Generally, major goals defined in its mid-term strategic plan (which was submitted to FCT within the framework of the assessment process and funding application for the period of 2018-2022) commit D'C-ISCTE to research work on cross-cutting and comprehensive topics addressing the key dynamics of contemporary socio-economic and territorial change and the inherent challenges for regulation and governance; to the mobilization of its researchers for innovation in research and communication methods, for intra- and interdisciplinary dialogue, and for strengthened co-operation with their national, foreign and international counterparts in research; as well as to openness to society.

A brief overview of the main strategic goals and features for the period 2018-2022 can be consulted at D'C-ISCTE [website](#).

This general strategic framework for the period of 2018-2022 (meanwhile considered the backbone for the funding programme from FCT for 2019-2023) is assumed as the structural background framework for the 2020's activity plan, and can be translated into a set of goals within which **three main levels** may be distinguished, presented in the three following sections:

1. Main scientific objectives to be pursued by the Unit
2. Main mid-term operative goals linked to the Unit's strategic programme
3. Specific goals established for 2020

2.2. Main scientific objectives that are pursued by the Unit

The research unit scientific goals are those inherent to the mission and the collective scientific identity of its research programmes, as described in section 1. The specific scientific objectives pursued by each Research Group, which are defined along Thematic Lines (assumed as mid-term research streamlines that can comprise several research programmes, materialized in different

research projects, both collective and individual), are presented in detail in part 3 of this Action Plan, for each Research Group, respectively.

In the research activities of the three RGs, as well in the efforts of transversality pursued through the three integrated thematic lines of research, priority will be given throughout the year 2020 to those more narrowly linked to the seven "Contributions to Knowledge" announced in the D'C-ISCTE Plan of Activities for 2018-2022 (Objectives and Strategy, point B, as well as publication *Dinâmia'CET – Activities 2013-2018 and Strategy*, Lisbon, May 2019).

2.3. Main mid-term operative goals that are linked to the Unit's strategic programme

This is a set of pragmatic objectives that are linked to the development of the research centre and to its expected activity in this period (many of them already identified and pursued in precedent years), which include:

- a) Consolidation of cross-cutting work and collaborative practices which have been promoted in recent years in the unit, among researchers and between research groups,
(Particularly with (i) the implementation of the three integrated thematic lines in D'C-ISCTE activities; (ii) the development of projects and project proposals crossing different groups, (iii) a new edition – the 5th, prepared in 2019 and held in February 2020 - of the Workshop D'C-ISCTE, and the preparation of a 6th edition (Strategic Plan 2018-2022, Objectives and Strategy, point A).
- b) Improvement in the requirements for individual research development plans in the Unit (associated to affiliation conditions and to pluriannual individual researchers assessment scheme) and enhancement of its attractiveness to young high-potential researchers (Strategic Plan 2018-2022, Objectives and Strategy, point A);
- c) Increase in research projects contracts, assuming the need to explore diversification of research funding opportunities, reducing the dependence on specific funding bodies (particularly FCT), aiming to strengthen the application to calls for European funding mechanisms (particularly but not exclusively H2020) and the application for applied projects for public and private institutions, and, whenever possible in the case of applications involving networks of centres, to take the lead in the setting up of such applications (Strategic Plan 2018-2022, Objectives and Strategy, point C);
- d) Increase in publications, particularly (but not exclusively) in indexed peer-reviewed journals and books with international dissemination;
(Considering the improvement of unit's financial situation from 2020 on, an effort will be made to provide better funding conditions to facilitate this purpose for integrated PhD researchers, as well as for integrated non-PhD researchers) (Strategic Plan 2018-2022, Objectives and Strategy, point C);
- e) Development of research networks and improvement of the Unit's role as a platform for hosting visitors and supporting internationalization initiatives (Strategic Plan 2018-2022, Objectives and Strategy, point C);
- f) Strengthening the relation between research and advanced training;
(e.g., Political Economy interdisciplinary PhD programme cycle of seminars; a new edition of DATMC (Architecture PhD programme) seminars linked to D'C-ISCTE Thematic Lines, resulting in a final publication; seminar cycles in several PhD and Master programmes; presentation of theses' results in unit's seminars; exhibitions showing work developed by students in specific courses, etc.) (Strategic Plan 2018-2022, Objectives and Strategy, point D);
- g) Growing dissemination of research results in academic events, both national and internationally;

(As mentioned above, better funding conditions are expected to facilitate this purpose for integrated PhD researchers as well as for integrated non-PhD researchers) (Strategic Plan 2018-2022, Objectives and Strategy, point E);

- h) Reaching broader audiences and overall society, both by improving communication of research results to non-academic audiences and by the active involvement of stakeholders and civil society in the projects' communication design (Strategic Plan 2018-2022, Objectives and Strategy, point F);
- i) Development of research networks and improvement of the Unit's role as a platform for hosting visitors and supporting internationalization initiatives (worth being repeated here, for also aiming at the fulfilment of Objectives and Strategy, point G of the Strategic Plan 2018-2022);
- j) Consolidation and strengthening of the technical support staff working at the research unit, improving specialized professionalization and enhancing skills at the several domains required to a growing research unit (projects management, financial management, science & technology management, communication, publishing, etc.)
- k) To improve the relational and organizational conditions (research conditions; careers; full/partial time; generational issues, ...)

2.4. Specific goals established for 2020

Short term objectives which were set up to be put into practice during 2020, include:

- a) General implementation of the strategic plan for 2018-2012, which has been the result of a strategic reflection process, started in 2016 about the scientific identity of the Unit, including the activation of mechanisms that enable permanent self-monitoring of the Unit's activity.

(This is expected to include, amongst other aspects, the transposition of the adopted strategic principles to all the communication channels (e.g. continue updating of website and other communication materials, institutional reports, etc., notably integrating the results of the reflexivity process on D'C-ISCTE scientific identity and on the individual relation of each researcher with it), as well as the operationalization of its principles (e.g.

implementation of the integrating thematic lines; internal reflexive discussions in each RG about their thematic lines, etc).

- b) Negotiation with the central structure of ISCTE-IUL of physical conditions to enable the provision of workplaces for the new necessities generated by the new researchers and new projects kicking off at D'C-ISCTE (specific short-term needs must be addressed, despite the promises undertaken by ISCTE-IUL for medium-term necessities, in the new premises under construction).
- c) Reinforcement of the research unit's technical structure and its specialized skills, and refinement of the attributions and competences of each member of the Unit's technical support team.

In the end of 2018 and in early 2019, discussions took place with the staff members, in order to better define each person's profile, and the needs for additional human resources. Negotiations with ISCTE-IUL's central structure and a new financial context enabled launching calls for new labour contracts in the end of 2019. During 2020, the reorganization of D'C-ISCTE staff and the individual functions of each member are expected to be stabilized. Specialized human resources are urgently required in the fields of financial and project management, as well as information management. Progressively more dedicated support should be devoted to prospection for funding opportunities, to dissemination of intra- and extra-unit information, and to the increase of D'C-ISCTEs publication series.

- d) Enhancement of the functioning of the organizational structure of D'C-ISCTE, particularly at the level of the scientific management of the research groups and its thematic lines, as well as of the new integrative cross-cutting thematic lines. A discussion process within each research group will be started, in order to enhance the efficiency of its functioning, the involvement of all researchers, and the articulation of individual and collective research agendas. It is expected that this process will culminate also in a discussion over the coordinators of research groups and facilitators of thematic lines, with possible refreshment of these teams, if considered adequate by the RGs. A clear attribution of responsibilities for promoting the three integrating thematic lines, with the nomination of coordinators (or coordination teams) for each of these lines, will also be part of this enhancement of the organizational structure.
- e) Continuation of the development of the commemorative programme celebrating the 30 years of DINÂMIA / 40 years of NET (then CET) / 10 years of DINÂMIA'CET-IUL, (2019-2020), including: a) Dynamization of integrating thematic lines, by the respective facilitators/coordinators; b) Organization of a Plenary Researchers Strategic Meeting, in February 2020, outside ISCTE-IUL, involving all researchers, with the objective of further internal reflection within each Research Group and its thematic lines; c) launching a call for papers, in the Spring of 2020, associated to the organization of an international conference to be held in 17-18 September 2020, structured around the three integrating transversal thematic lines; d) preparation of the publication of a book with the results of this process.

- f) Development of a system for monitoring and assessing the research activity of full-time contract researchers

(Answering a demand of the former Rectorate, a draft regulation for the assessment of researchers' activity was produced by the end of 2017 thanks to the effort of a task force that was appointed by D'C-ISCTE management. Following the several changes in ISCTE-IUL's policy concerning this issue, and after the elaboration of internal norms in 2017, a process of discussion of this issue was re-launched by the ISCTE-IUL rectorate, once again requesting the collaboration of the research units in the preparation of a unified/central assessment system. D'C-ISCTE will continue contributing to this discussion in 2020, based on the existing draft, and the discussions held on 2019 on this topic.

- g) Revision of internal functioning norms and D'C-ISCTE regulation, concerning the updating of membership statutes (including the categories of members and the respective attributions/responsibilities in light of new FCT requirements), as well as the RG coordinators' attributions

(Clarification of these rules and procedures has been developed and will be further regulated; RG coordinators' role should be explicit in the Unit's regulation, following an ISCTE-IUL Rectorate request)

- h) Improvement of DINÂMIA'CET's information system, including the development of a comprehensive, updated and user friendly database with the scientific activities of all its members, which can be easily mobilized for monitoring the research unit's activity, with a versatility that enables more flexible analytical dimensions, but ensuring long-run comparison and homogeneous criteria.

(For this, it is essential to continue to explore the potential of articulation of the internal system – based on the recollection of information annually through “Fichas individuais de investigador” – with ISCTE-IUL's information systems, particularly Ciência-IUL, Fenix and i-meritus platforms, where most of the researchers are expected to enter information about their activity, in the various fields of their academic and scientific activity. A better articulation with this, in the sequence of what was already made during 2018 and 2019, will simplify the internal processes of recollection, classification and treatment of information, not dismissing for now, however, the direct collection of some specific information from the researchers, that which is not covered by the aforementioned sources).

- i) Preparation of a new D'C-ISCTE publishing line (*e-books*), in parallel to the enhancement of the WP series and the development of further indexation of CCT Journal, as well as the dynamization of *Passagens* Journal, in line with what was established within Strategic Plan 2018-2022. Specific mechanisms to promote the publication by young researchers and the connection to the PhD programmes in which D'C-ISCTE is involved will be envisaged.
- j) Setting up of the two new observatories that are foreseen in the Strategic Plan 2018-2022: LxHabidata and Youth Labour Employment Observatory.

- k) Definition of the conditions, regulations and mechanisms to set up in practice (including the elaboration of calls and the selection process) for the hiring of the research-dedicated human resources (grants and contracts) considered in the Strategic Plan 2018-2022 (taking the possibilities established by the funding contracts with FCT into account).
- l) Definition of the conditions and regulations for the setting of up of the new incentive mechanisms established in the Strategic Plan 2018-2022, namely (i) the support to the internationalization of young researchers; (ii) the awards for social impact of research (both collective and individual); (iii) the incentive for open access publication; and (iv) the mechanisms to promote internationalization through the application of big international research projects (e.g., to H2020 or similar programmes)
- m) Development of a monitoring system for the social impacts of the unit's activity (Drawing upon the previous reflection on this topic and the work initiated in 2019, a working group will galvanize this task. Conceptual and empirical work will be pursued on this, including the implementation of routines and data systematization practices, which should enable mapping, controlling and disseminating the social impacts of the unit's activity)
- n) Improvement of the monitoring system for the academic impacts of the unit's activity, as well as its researchers

(Drawing upon the work initiated in 2019, a working group will galvanize this task. Conceptual and empirical work will be developed on this, including the implementation of routines, data systematization practices, and development of an appropriate and efficient database, which helps to understand, map and better systematize the diversity of the unit's academic outputs and the multiple results of its researchers' activity. This will also require a better coordination with ISCTE-IUL information system in these matters: Ciência-IUL)
- o) Dissemination and implementation of DINÂMIA'CET-IUL ethical principles, codified within the framework of the design of the Unit's strategic programme (point 13). This will include the setting up of an internal researchers meeting/seminar on this topic during 2020.

3. RESEARCH GROUPS

3.1. INNOVATION AND LABOUR (IL)

This Research Group aims to study two interdependent domains (Thematic Lines Innovation and Labour) and their interconnections. Sustainable growth comprises environmental, economic, social and political dimensions that have to be dealt with in an interrelated manner.

The major challenge is to foster interconnectedness between subjects related to innovation and labour issues, in the current context of digital transformation. Group members are planning to submit a research proposal on digital skills and the role of different players in developing those skills to a FCT Call.

The research continues to stand on methodological pluralism trying to integrate social sciences with technical tools to properly explore the impacts of technological change. Multiple research methodologies, qualitative and quantitative approaches will continue to support empirical analysis of the Research Group members.

Previous research has proven that different tools of multivariate data analysis are suitable for the subjects and empirical analysis of the Group research agenda. Therefore, it is expected that the fsQCA, fuzzy cluster analysis, as well as econometric tools will continue to be used to examine national and international datasets. In addition, case studies and surveys for collection of primary information will be used, as well as social network analysis to analyse the relationships built by actors. Comparative analysis continues to be a key strategy of this Research Group.

In addition to publication and dissemination activities specific to each Thematic Line (Innovation and Labour), the Research Group members will participate in the 40 years Commemoration Conference of DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE to be held in 2020, as well as other transversal activities of DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE.

Likewise, they will deepen collaboration with other research centres, from both ISCTE and elsewhere in Portugal and abroad. Therefore, an increased participation at international projects, namely European projects, is an objective of this Group, whose members have a long-lasting tradition of international collaboration and networking.

Finally, the Group wishes to participate in projects launched at ISCTE and elsewhere to study the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic on the living and working conditions; the challenges posed to national health and care systems; and the way digital technologies are fostering homeworking, remote teaching and research.

3.1.1. Innovation (Coord: Isabel Salavisa)

The Innovation team members will continue to work on topics related to: the creation and diffusion of scientific and technological knowledge and innovation, namely in renewable energies, additive manufacturing and other; the creation of knowledge-intensive firms, academic spin-offs

and others; the transformation of large socio-technical systems, like the energy system and the food system in the transition to sustainability; the role of actors, values, norms, policies and forms of governance in these processes; and intellectual capital management.

The team will participate in proposals to be submitted in areas such as the impact of digital transformation on skills and the role of different players in developing digital skills (jointly with Labour team researchers); the transformation and response of the different industrial sectors in the context of the energy system transition; and copyright protection in additive manufacturing with blockchain.

Most of the research draws on empirical analysis, resorting to different quantitative and qualitative techniques – econometrics, case studies and social network analysis – and a large array of data, both primary and secondary.

More specifically, the team members target the following theoretical and empirical goals:

1. Creation of scientific and technological knowledge

Through the study of the creation, dissemination and use of knowledge in emerging technological areas, such as renewable energies (wind, solar and ocean-based) and additive manufacturing.

2. Dissemination of knowledge

With the study of the entrepreneurial performance of academic spin-offs and the role of academic spin-offs as intermediators between higher education organizations and business.

3. Impact of innovation

With the study of the impact of innovation on society and economy, namely renewable energy technologies, additive manufacturing, artificial intelligence and robotics.

4. Transitions to sustainability

Regarding the study of the transition of the energy system in a comparative perspective; and the study of the transition of the food system in a comparative perspective.

5. Intellectual capital management

Through the development of this methodology to foster application to the strategic management of organizations and cities, and the study of its relationships with innovation and sustainability.

Team members will be engaged in dissemination through traditional channels (scientific conferences, papers, articles, book chapters and the publishing of an international book), but also through the organization of the 2nd edition of the international conference ECIAIR – European Conference on the Impact of Artificial Intelligence and Robotics, to be held at ISCTE, in October 2020.

3.1.2. Labour (Coord: Fátima Suleman)

Contemporary labour market issues are the major concern of this research team. The proposals for future research show a certain continuity and a strategy towards the deepening of such research. The team aims to submit research proposals on digital skills formation (jointly with Innovation team researchers); unemployment and regulations; and labour market segmentation at the FCT call for grants. Either contemporary issues or new proposals involve a multidisciplinary approach to examine both labour market regulations, individual-based outcomes, as well as the firms' decisions regarding their human resources.

Research members attempt to combine qualitative and quantitative data, using appropriate data analysis tools. Furthermore, the members attempt to reinforce the comparative perspective taking advantage of international datasets available to researchers, often trying to extend previous research to more countries.

Team members are engaged in dissemination through traditional channels (scientific conferences, papers, articles, book chapters) but, more importantly, through the organization of two conferences: the 2nd edition of a major international conference on vulnerable categories: "Mulheres, Mundos do Trabalho e Cidadania – Diferentes Olhares, Outras Perspetivas", to be held at Iscte in December 2020; and the III Congresso Hispano-Português de Segurança Social, to be held at ISCTE in 2020.

Post-graduate courses will continue to be a fruitful channel to further explore some particular topics (e.g. training policies for young graduates; authority and co-operation; graduates in non-graduates' jobs). Often, master and PhD students integrate ongoing research projects.

More specifically, the team members target the following theoretical and empirical goals:

1. The quality of work and jobs

- Re-examine theoretical models of firms' behaviours and their impacts on the quality of working life;
- Examine the firm-level and individual-level drivers of job quality and vulnerable workers (e.g. older workers, women; young workers) in a comparative perspective using international datasets;
- Examine the employment conditions of higher education graduates in the context of expansion and economic recession in EU countries;
- Examine how digital work contributes to degrade the quality of work and increase unemployment;
- Examine how financiarization of the economy affects labour market outcomes;
- Examine the impact of country-level characteristics on workers categories.

2. Skill requirements in the labour market

- Analyse the skills required from higher education graduation;
- Contribute to the debate on graduate and non-graduate jobs in the context of higher education expansion;
- Analyse how firms acquire or develop skills.

3. Labour market regulation

- Analyse the collective bargaining systems in Europe;
- Explore the challenges of unions in the context of labour market flexibility and Uber-like employment relationships;
- Examine changes in labour legislation and collective bargaining;
- Examine labour legislation for specific categories of workers.

4. Firms' social responsibility

- Examine the relationship between corporate social responsibility and employees' behaviour;
- Examine factors that affect firms' attractiveness.

3.2. CITIES AND TERRITORIES (CT)

This Group focuses its research on the territorial dimensions of contemporary socioeconomic, environmental and cultural change, analysing its complex restructuring mechanisms in the light of their spatiality, their territorial embeddedness and their spatial-morphological dimensions, framing them in the scope of the action towards the promotion of multidimensional sustainable development processes.

The deep restructurings which affected the organization of socioeconomic and physical systems since the 1970's, and their technological and socio-cultural drivers, raising the centrality of informational, cognitive and symbolic contents to these processes, brought new challenges to the way we conceptualize, empirically analyse, plan and develop public policies for urban and rural territories. The complexity of movements and rationalities behind centripetal and centrifugal dynamics, which affect urban systems, and the organization of metropolitan spaces today also raise new questionings and challenges to the ways cities are shaped and planned and how academics can develop tools to understand and act in increasingly complex systems and develop tools to promote their resilience. This research group invests in the disentangling of these processes, through a variety of themes (e.g., the urban form, creative dynamics, ways of inhabiting, recompositions processes, urban representations, among others) and empirical contexts (from the in-depth analysis of Portuguese metropolitan areas and cities, to comparative analysis with European or Lusophone cities, for example), favouring an interdisciplinary perspective which is nurtured by this research group's diversity.

The Cities and Territories Research Group strategy for deepening knowledge about the dynamics of change in these spatial and territorial terms is based on the acknowledgment of the diversity of logics, processes and actors that produce and appropriate these processes. This is always done from a triple perspective, involving (i) the analysis of the "dynamics" themselves; (ii) the understanding of the regulation and planning issues and the aspects related to urban/territorial action and "policy-making"; and (iii), a "reflexive" consciousness of the way these spaces are worked and how they are studied.

This encompasses a permanent concern with the deployment of new planning methodologies and ideas in urban and social policy design, often based on research-action processes, and fostering the creation of useful knowledge to facilitate agents' action and policy-making, concerning urban planning and regional/local development strategies in Portugal and elsewhere, and providing public officials and community leaders with new tools for management and policy analysis.

The research group is also committed to the development of new methodologies to disseminate research results to society and to consolidate bridges between academia, policy makers and civil society.

THEMATIC LINES

3.2.1. Creativity, culture and territory (Criatividade, Actividades Culturais e Território) (Coord: Pedro Costa)

This Thematic Line carries out fundamental and applied research on the role of the arts and culture in fostering development, the competitiveness of territories and urban revitalization from both a historic and contemporary perspective. It seeks to understand the territoriality of these activities and creative dynamics, getting a perception of their organization and spatiality and, on the other hand, it strives to shed light on their multiple contributions to various aspects of sustainable development and the resilience of the territories.

The six research programmes within this TL are:

- A. Urban artistic interventions;
- B. Culture, knowledge, competitiveness and territorial development;
- C. Cultural districts and creative dynamics: new methodologies of analysis;
- D. Structuring cultural activities, pathways and publics;
- E. Creative tourism;
- F. Art, heritage and territories.

The main scientific objectives of this Thematic Line are:

- i) To develop conceptual and empirical work on the role of cultural activities in the promotion of territorial development and inform territorially-based cultural planning;
- ii) To develop conceptual and empirical work in order to understand the role of urban milieus in the development of creativity and cultural activities;
- iii) To develop conceptual and empirical work in the assessment of the multidimensional impacts and effects of cultural activities in terms of sustainable development processes.
- iv) To disentangle the socio-economic functioning of cultural activities, creation processes, audiences, and their relation with the territory (in specific empirical cases: e.g. performing arts, architecture, alternative music; photo festivals);
- v) To study and put into practice and test urban interventions and art in public spaces;
- vi) To study, conceptually and empirically, and to help the development of creative tourism practices, particularly in low-density areas;

- vii) To further explore the relation between art, heritage, architecture, history and territories;
- viii) To develop the exploration of new methodologies and concepts for artistic urban interventions and to enhance participation-research methodologies.

Goals of this Thematic Line for 2020 include the development of the objectives of the several ongoing collective research projects (CREATOUR, 4H-CREAT, Parallel, Artsbank, RESHAPE; Oeiras-Cultura; ARTEMREDE-Impactos1) and the submission of new project proposals to different competitive calls (H2020, Creative Europe, FCT), as well as the continuation of the multiple individual (Post-Doc and PhD projects) in course in this thematic line. Several international conferences are being co-organized in 2020 (including the 2nd international “Todas as Artes” conference and KISMIF2020 conference, as well as a special session at CONLAB2020) and at least two Thematic Line seminars are envisaged. The uncertainty context caused by COVID-19 pandemic crisis will, however, probably jeopardize the organization of these events, which can be re-scheduled or turned into online events. Expected outputs include several international presentations, working papers, book chapters, papers in scientific peer-reviewed journals, as well as the aforementioned submission of new projects. Exhibitions, urban interventions and audio-visual outputs are also expected results of the diverse projects.

3.2.2. Representations and discourse on architecture and territory (Representação e discurso na arquitectura e no território) (Coord: Paulo Tormenta Pinto)

This Thematic Line conducts research focused on discourse and representation in the practice and theory of architecture, primarily on questions related to the copyright and contextual interpretation of architectural work, taking a perspective that crosses the contemporary with the history of architecture and urbanism. This multiple interpretation of the various forms of representation and discourse is understood to be as important as the research line on the change of the territory and contemporary society.

The four research programmes within this line are:

- A. Representation of contemporary space;
- B. Architecture, landscape and territory
- C. Architecture and Portuguese architects: portraits and dynamics;
- D. Architectural practice and teaching.

The main scientific objectives of this Thematic Line are:

- i) Analysis of the territorial representation on architectural thought and on the discourse(s) of architecture;
- ii) Study of the authorial dimension of spatial development projects and their urban insertion;
- iii) Analysis of the representations of architecture in other fields (literature, cinema, etc.);
- iv) Study of architects' biographies and architecture schools, particularly in Portugal;
- v) Analysis of the meanings of authorial and popular architectures.
- vi) Reflexive analysis of the profession and of the pedagogical practices in architecture.

Goals for 2020 concerning the “Representations and discourse on architecture and territory” Thematic Line include the following-up of seminars fostering debate and critical assessment of PhD theses and the joint organization (with ISTAR-IUL) of the annual colloquium in the framework of the PhD programme. The FCT funded project “The Grand Projects - Architectural and Urbanistic Operations after the 1998 Lisbon World Exposition”, involving a large number of researchers, is central in the work of this thematic line during 2020. A multiplicity of individual research projects (particularly in the framework of Architecture of Contemporary Metropolitan Territories), but also at Post-doctoral level, are also central for this thematic line, and new research proposals submitted to competitive calls are expected as well.

3.2.3. Ways of Living, Society and Architectural Culture (Modos de Habitar, Sociedade e Cultura Arquitectónica) (Coord: Ana Vaz Milheiro)

This Thematic Line develops several sub-lines of research on the issues of architectural culture and history, housing and ways of living. The analysis carried out deals with the architectural production and the sociological presuppositions of architecture, considering the private and public initiatives, understanding local specificities, national and international realms.

Five research programmes are defined in the scope of this Thematic Line.

- A. Architectural culture, in contemporary and historical scopes;
- B. Housing, habitat and ways of living;
- C. Residential behaviour, social and housing re-composition in the metropolis;
- D. Post-colonial perspectives on Portuguese-speaking countries' urban growth;
- E. Rehabilitation, regeneration and urban revitalization.

The main scientific objectives of the Thematic Line are:

- i) Analysis of the private housing market dynamics, residential trajectories and their relationship with the social recomposition of territories and ways of inhabiting;
- ii) Support to the formulation, implementation and evaluation of public policies, including rehabilitation and urban regeneration;
- iii) Analysis of the morphologic dimension of housing projects and their urban insertion;
- iv) Study of the urban development processes in colonial and post-colonial contexts (with particular focus on Portuguese-speaking African countries, Macao and Brazil)

In 2020, researchers involved in the “Ways of Living: Society and Architectural Culture” thematic line will carry out a diversity of activities related to all its five research programmes by participating in conferences (presenting papers, attending as keynote speakers, etc.), publishing articles, organizing books, setting up exhibitions, organizing seminars, workshops, etc. Besides collective projects in course (MCMH, funded by FCT, and several activities under the COST Action CA18137 “European Middle Class Mass Housing”), several ongoing PhD theses are being developed under this TL in ISCTE-IUL, both in ISCTE-IUL and other institutions.

3.2.4. Recompositions, metropolitan change and housing (Recomposições, mudança metropolitana e habitação) (Coord: Teresa Costa Pinto, M^a Assunção Gato and Sandra Marques Pereira)

This Thematic Line focuses on the understanding of contemporary housing systems, socioeconomic recompositions and metropolitan dynamics of change, taking into account the multiple impacts, interests, conflicts and associated values.

Five research programmes in the scope of this TL are:

- A. Structural social and economic recompositions in the Lisbon Metropolitan Area;
- B. Metropolization dynamics (peri-urban and suburban territories, small and medium-sized cities);
- C. Global processes of urban change (e.g. gentrification, touristification, financialization/commodification);
- D. City consumptions, lifestyles and quality of life;
- E. Housing, residential practices, markets and politics.

The main scientific objectives of this Thematic Line are:

- i) To understand the dynamics of recomposition and change in the Lisbon Metropolitan Area and to assess the several impacts resulting from these changes, while developing comparative analyses with other territories;
- ii) To understand the metropolitan transformation dynamics, with particular focus on suburban and peri-urban areas and on restructuring areas, not neglecting small and medium-sized cities;
- iii) To conceptualize and empirically inform the relations between territorial change and globalized processes of economic, social, and cultural transformation, focusing on the effects produced in cities and their populations;
- iv) To analyse socioeconomic and territorial recompositions in light with consumption practices, lifestyles and quality of life;
- v) To understand and analyse the contemporary housing and residential practices, in line with market transformations and public policies.

The team members continue to work on the topics targeting the housing, recompositions and territorial change analysis in different perspectives. In this sense, the current changes in Lisbon's housing and the awareness of their high speed require a new approach on their monitoring - the need to capture them in (almost) real time. For this purpose, some members of this TL are developing LXHABIDATA, which is an open-source platform of georeferenced data on housing including different indicators to be collected/published quarterly. It has 4 main targets: citizens/civil society; public stakeholders; academics; real estate agents. The platform is built and will be soon available online. It is an innovative tool that fills a void in the academic and the wider urban context of Lisbon. For the same purpose, the organization of some scientific events is already scheduled. Within COVID-19 the team of LXHABIDATA is developing two other initiatives: Survey Housing and COVID-19 - an online survey about the impacts of COVID-19 on housing; Barometer Impacts of COVID-19 on Short-Term rental (Alojamento Local), a partnership with Associação do Alojamento Local in Portugal aiming at a quarterly survey to STR. Since the 2020 European Network for Housing Research has been cancelled, there is an intention to launch a Webinar of the Southern European Housing Working Group. The publication of book chapters and articles in national and international journals is expected, given the different stages in which some are already within the scope of the publication process. In addition, several individual research projects are underway and new research proposals were submitted to competitive calls. Furthermore, and taking advantage of the networks that emerge from these research initiatives, the members seek to strengthen their analytical and critical knowledge around the key issues that bring them together in this Thematic Line.

3.2.5. Territorial governance, spatial planning and socio-spatial intervention (Governação territorial, ordenamento do território e intervenção socio-espacial) (Coord: Maria Fátima Ferreira)

The aim of this Thematic Line is to analyse (and whenever possible to participate in and/or evaluate) the formal and informal public intervention processes of spatial planning, strategic planning, master or specific plans, and to glean further knowledge on the rationale of socio-territorial interventions that result from either public initiative (or financing) or citizens' movements in response to concrete problems. It also strives to tackle questions of regional and local development in light of the endogenous and exogenous dynamics of the territories, examining the respective development strategies in terms of the negotiation of interests of the different (public and private) agents involved and the resulting rationale of regulations and governance.

Seven research programmes are defined in the scope of this Line for the period:

- A. Planning instruments and spatial planning;
- B. Socio-spatial intervention, social inclusion and community development;
- C. Territorial development and regional and local development policies;
- D. Planning and enhancing facilities and public spaces;
- E. Territorial management and metropolitan governance;
- F. Participation, associativism and citizenship;
- G. Innovative milieus, networks and territorial development.

The main scientific objectives of this Thematic Line are:

- i) To analyse the relationship between development, territorial cohesion and regional and local planning and policies;
- ii) To assess and help monitor public policies, namely at local/regional level, developing public advising in the diverse fields related to urban planning and territorial development
- iii) To help the design of public policies related with spatial planning and strategic planning of territories and cities;
- iv) To discuss governance issues and contribute to the theoretical development of the analysis on governance, public policies and planning methodologies;
- v) To understand the role of community-rooted development mechanisms, participation and urban social movements;
- vi) To promote the deepening of the analysis of the governance processes of territorial systems and planning strategies;

The aim of this Thematic Line is to contribute to action in spatial planning processes and to develop knowledge on socio-territorial interventions that result from either public initiative (or funding) or citizens' movements in response to concrete problems. It also strives to tackle questions of territorial development examining agent's strategies concerning potential regulation and governance. The contemporaneous challenges concerning agency, social innovation and transdisciplinary research for capacity building in territorial development and resilience are also included in the scope of research concerns of this Thematic Line (e.g. projects RURACTION, DIMAT/SIGA, IPolitécnicos, Incubadora Popular d'Ajuda). There is space for further reinforcement of synergy and scientific co-operation within this Thematic Line along 2020. Expected outputs include working papers, book chapters, papers in scientific peer-reviewed journals and submission of projects. The organization of international conferences and seminars and the collaboration in the organization in international conferences leading to international publications is also an important streamline under this thematic line.

3.2.6. Urban Morphology and Sustainability (Morfologia Urbana e Sustentabilidade) (Coord: Teresa Marat-Mendes)

This Thematic Line focuses on the analysis of urban morphology and the operational rationale and structuring of territorial planning and urban metabolism, through the lens of sustainability. Specifically, it focusses on the social and ecological dimensions of the urban metabolic performance, while relating to the built environment. Given the interdisciplinary vocation of the urban metabolism term, this should be used as a concept that bridges perspectives and insights across different disciplines with a common interest: the study of the social and environmental performance of the territory and cities. Both urban and rural realities are assumed as a strategic dynamic and transversal factor for the development of the territories of the future.

Four research programmes are defined in the scope of this Thematic Line for the current period:

- A. Urban morphology and urban planning;
- B. Urban metabolism, environment and sustainability;
- C. Technologies and modernization of the Habitat;
- D. Food Systems, short circuits, food quality and security.

The main scientific objectives of this Thematic Line are:

- i) to understand the evolution of the urban metabolism and its relationship to society sustainability challenges;
- ii) to disclose land uses managements and land property in rural and urban areas;

- iii) to promote interdisciplinary methodological approaches concerning the description and prescription of urban form;
- iv) to help the management of environmental risks and natural resources;
- v) to explore technological issues and natural resources use efficiency;
- vi) to enhance the knowledge and policy advisory tools concerning urban planning and food systems. Specifically, with impact on food security, food quality, access to food, and their relationship with other sectoral development policies, as the rural ones.

The main activities that are expected to take place in 2020 are related to the development of the SPLACH project and the preparation of new research proposals and seminars on sustainability thematic, as well as the development of several individual projects that are ongoing under this TL. Several publications are being prepared, as well as the presentation of seminars. Several post-doc and young researchers are being mobilized and show interest in this thematic line, which will contribute to reinforce the number of activities and publications. Current PhD works are being developed within this Thematic Line, related to issues of urban planning, urban sustainability, foodscape morphologies and sustainability, changes of living and urban form. The discussion is also expected to expand and increase contributions of this TL among DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE researchers.

3.3. GOVERNANCE, ECONOMY AND CITIZENRY (GEC)

This Group centres its research on the modes of regulation and governance, encompassing state's intervention, markets and forms of collective action, in the context of Europeanization and globalization trends. It is assumed that, in addition to the means used by governments to guarantee the rule of law and to promote public policies, new forms of public and private regulation are becoming increasingly relevant, based on co-operation, self-regulation and mobilization of social actors. Both formal modes and processes of regulation, including the legislative procedure, as well as "soft" law-making, and informal modes of social and economic (market) regulation, are studied, with special attention to their impact on the citizens' individual rights and capacity of action, which they can promote or hinder. Among the domains under scrutiny are environmental and public health risks, ICT, financial markets, social policies.

This Group also provides a framework for research on science communication and public engagement, as well as on the role and social responsibility of science and its actors, including researchers and research institutions, all of them actually increasingly asked to participate in regulatory processes. This is in line with the Centre's strategic objective to promote the self-reflexivity of its researchers in order to better serve society. Economics has been especially concerned by this endeavour, but other scientific disciplines of relevance to the Centre – namely architecture and law – started similar lines of work.

Taking advantage of inputs from economics, jurisprudence, sociology, political science, architecture, and computer science, this Research Group's thematic lines follow up from this backdrop, sustained by work developed in recent years at the Centre under projects BECOM, Value Isobars, Protect, Risks of S&T in the era of social networks, FESSUD, MORE-PE, OPEN-EC and RECON.

THEMATIC LINES

3.3.1. Human Rights, Markets and Governance Challenges (Direitos Humanos, Mercados e Desafios da Governação) (Coord: Ana Costa)

Research focusing on the role and impact of the financial system in contemporary societies, specifically on economic performance, income distribution, environmental sustainability, and on regulation of financial systems. Research has also been devoted to the analysis of the crisis narratives which have prevailed during the Portuguese "adjustment programme" both in the design of austerity policies and in their public discussion in the media.

Ongoing research centres on regulatory challenges raised by technological developments with a focus on Information and Communications Technologies. Seemingly, big data technologies, the Internet of Things and related developments are bringing up new instances of the so-called "law-

technology lag". Research has been devoted to the discussion of the extent to which the reform of the data protection regimes in the EU (entered into force in 2018) is up to the challenges brought about by technological progresses and their implications on the protection of fundamental human rights, namely the right to personal data protection and privacy, and freedoms in general.

The circumstances under which the Action Plan is being written changed enormously since the situation around COVID-19 escalated dramatically. The implications of this whole situation in terms of social conditions, of different modes of provision and their resilience, of the role of the state and of globalization trends are not still completely established, but they will certainly be at the centre of this Thematic Line research. Nevertheless, the formation of new political coalitions and alternatives call for the mobilization of new discourses and the establishment of new consensus in terms of institutionalized meanings, a line of inquiry that has been at the centre of our research.

The main scientific objectives of this Thematic Line are:

- A) To participate in the production of knowledge about the impacts of financialization to the Portuguese economy and society;
- B) To critically analyse how European citizens have been exercising their political and social rights in the wake of the economic crisis;
- C) To critically analyse the multidimensional and cumulative economic, social and political impacts of the economic crisis and to assess their permanent feature;
- D) To contribute to the development of a comprehensive approach about the impacts of the COVID-19 crisis integrating, in particular, the following dimensions: a) the disjuncture between located experimented consequences and globalization trends; b) the different sectoral dynamics in response to the crisis in terms of wages, employment, working conditions and inequality; c) the state's intervention and the national and European political answers to the crisis; c) the political alternatives to re-link the economy with society.
- E) To shape concepts for debating the impact of economic discourses, in particular, in relation to crisis and its relationship to the support of certain economic policies;
- F) To critically analyse how European law and regulation is addressing the risks to human rights arising from digital technologies' applications.

3.3.2. Reflexivity, Communication, and Social Responsibility of Science (Reflexividade, Comunicação e Responsabilidade Social da Ciência) (Coord: Pierre Guibentif)

An output of the activities of the TL should be the development, on the one hand, of training methodologies and scientific practices that understand training itself and research as “democratic experiences” that include forms of integration and communication of innovative knowledge and, on the other hand, of spaces of external communication that can feed more open and broader debates and, in so doing, rescue the original purpose of Academia.

In more general terms, the aim of our work could be formulated as follows: **Development of citizenship capabilities.**

One of our main topics is the renewal of economic thought, underpinned by the study and updating of economic theory and dialogue with other disciplines, namely economic sociology and law. In addition, we intend to foster reflection on the relation between strands of economic thought and analysis and the social responsibility of university research: to what extent does it make sense to talk of the neutrality of economic science?

To participate in the operations of our complex societies requires a high level of knowledge and the capacity to mobilize that knowledge in actual intervention. Scientific research is challenged to contribute to the production of that knowledge under new organizational conditions, always exposed to react to new types of emergencies, as we do experience it with the COVID-19 outbreak. This may put into question our usual practices and tools. Among them are the disciplines, as organizationally stabilized differentiations in the domain of science. This is a topic of special interest for our interdisciplinary research centre. One of our researchers addresses it directly with a research project on new paradigms of transdisciplinarity.

But scientific research also should engage:

(1) in its dissemination, through its own activities, as well as in co-operation with all kind of media (scientific communication), and

(2) in the improvement of its mobilization in actual intervention, in particular taking advantage of experiences, collected in the domain of scientific research itself, of the relationship between the roles of scientist – responsible for the production of accurate knowledge – and of citizen – co-responsible for the proper use of that knowledge (reflexivity and social responsibility) (a topic addressed in particular by a work on legal subjectivity, to be finalized for publication in 2020).

In 2020, work of the TL in these domains will consist in particular in giving special attention and support to the following two D'C-ISCTE internal processes: the implementation of the integrating thematic lines, and the discussion about the ethical commitment of D'C-ISCTE and its researchers, as well as of the ways of enforcement of this document.

In the approach of these issues, the consequences of the COVID-19 outbreak have to be placed at the centre of our discussions. The current circumstances are giving a new centrality to scientific research, as a tool in the combat of the disease, as well as of the planning of the measures to be taken with a view to the recovery after the outbreak. This obliges us to rethink about our way of communicating about our work, but also of organizing our work and planning the outputs of it.

At the same time, the current almost planetary confinement conditions massively our researchers – and citizens' – practices. In particular, it obliges us to switch to an exclusively virtual mode of

meeting. This changes dramatically our experience of society, of communities within society, and will have an impact on our professional identities. This is definitely a domain in which the careful analysis of what happens to science on the ground – actually in the private spheres of the researchers now partially obliged to turn them into spaces of professional action – has a direct relevance for the discussion of what happens to society as whole.

Under these institutional and general circumstances, the main scientific objectives of this Thematic Line, however, deserve to be maintained. They are:

- A) To participate in the production of knowledge about the scientific world and its relationship to its environment, paying particular attention to the impact on this relationship of the COVID-19 pandemic and the political responses to it;
- B) To take advantage in this reflexive exercise of recent developments in social theory;
- C) To contribute to the development of tools for evaluating the impact of scientific research;
- D) To shape concepts for debating politics of science;
- E) To provide individual researchers and research organizations with the appropriate tools to analyze the contexts in which they operate, and to define their own line of action;
- F) Cross-cutting these different objectives: to pay particular attention to the relationship between specialists and non-specialists, as intersecting with other major societal divides.

SOME PROSPECTS FOR 2020 FOR GEC RESEARCH GROUP

(Attention: This sub-section is essentially based in the recollection of researcher's intentions in January 2020, and many of these, particularly the ones related to events organization and presence in academic events was – or will be – affected by COVID-19 pandemic and all the mitigation measures assumed in the current context; some of these changes are already signed, but not all of them – therefore, this lists should be considered as merely indicative of some of the main intentions of the RG for 2020, which are, as always, subject to change, but in this case with an additional degree of uncertainty, and facing the possibility of readjustments in its scheduling, in the local or type of realization – some of them were already converted to webinars, for instance – or even cancelation of events).

Collective Projects (starting)

Collective projects are being prepared to be submitted for funding in FCT call for scientific research projects, in the scope of D'C-ISCITE GOVERNANCE, ECONOMY AND CITIZENRY RG. It is expected that some of these projects will be funded, starting in 2021.

“Provision of services for the development of solutions to improve the efficiency and reliability of objectives and risk management in the application phase and analysis of payment requests from beneficiaries of Portugal 2020 incentive systems, using automatic learning techniques”, coordinated by Ricardo Paes Mamede and funded by IAPMEI, starting in March 2020.

Ongoing Collective projects

1. REVAL - From internal devaluation to the revaluation of work: the case of Portugal (coord.: Maria da Paz Campos Lima). This research project, clearly in the domain of labour, joint researchers from the RG's IL and GEC, meant to promote cross-fertilization between different theoretical and methodological approaches developed by these RG's. Ongoing research, to be pursued in 2020, aims at making a contribution for the debate on the 'variegated' sectoral impact of internal devaluation by presenting some preliminary results about the Portuguese case, comparing the evolution of industrial relations and of collective bargaining in several sectors and the relation to trends in labour share and income inequality.
2. Participation in the Food and Agriculture COST Action FA1305 (Maria José dos Santos)
3. “Le droit et les crises”, collaborative research network for the publication of the special issue of the journal *Droit et Société* (Pierre Guibentif). Final revisions after peer reviews were carried out and approved in 2019, having the launching of the special issue being scheduled for spring 2020. The network is preparing a document to be published at that occasion on the official blog of the journal linking the topic “Le droit et les crises” to the new context brought about by the COVID-19 outbreak.

4. INTEGRATING THEMATIC LINES

The working plan designed to end in 2019 has to be implemented. It includes - the promotion of this new device, - the preparation of the event celebrating the 10 years of DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE as organic unit of ISCTE, 30 years of DINÂMIA, and 40 years of CET, which will be an occasion to test the potential of the ITL for establishing bridges between researchers, projects, and RG, - and the very first steps in the setting up of D'C-ISCTE research projects taking advantage of the exchanges between researchers favoured by the ITL.

The promotion includes the development, by the team of facilitators, of the information published on the DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE website, and the presentation of the ITL at the D'C researchers meeting organized in February.

The preparation of the event includes the drafting of the call for contributions to the celebrating event, its presentation at the referred researchers' meeting; the support to interested researchers in their attempts to apply the concepts underlying the topics of the ITL in the research in different domains of D'C; the selection of contributions with the support of the scientific commission of D'C; the design of a programme based on the selected contributions; the invitation of external discussants, etc.

In parallel, the facilitators will start a follow-up of the projects of D'C researchers, aiming at identifying imaginative connections between them, likely to inspire new research projects in line with D'C mission to study social change, with a view to apply for funding which may come up during 2021. Earlier initiatives are to be considered according to the circumstances. It may be assumed, however, that effective co-operation across RG, based on a robust conceptual framework, may require some time for preparatory work.

Details about this work programme are to be found in the document prepared by the facilitator team, ratified by the management of the unit, and presented to its scientific commission in November 2019, *Planeamento do trabalho de dinamização das Linhas Temáticas Integradoras do DINÂMIA'CET-ISCTE*, which includes a detailed roadmap.

The work on the new ITL will coincide with the indispensable reorientation of many of our research efforts after the COVID-19 outbreak. The challenge is to take the best possible advantage of our work on social change in the approach of the processes triggered by this outbreak in all domains of society (see the above section 1.3. "One Immediate Critical Challenge").
